ABSTRAK

Penelitian ini bertujuan untuk mengetahui efektivitas penggunaan cerita bergambar dalam pengajaran pemahaman membaca untuk meningkatkan keterampilan membaca siswa di SMPN 08 Palopo. Penelitian ini menggunakan desain pra-eksperimental dengan pendekatan satu kelompok, yaitu pretest dan posttest. Populasi penelitian terdiri dari 227 siswa kelas VIII yang tersebar di tujuh kelas. Sampel dipilih menggunakan teknik purposive sampling. Peneliti menetapkan kelas VIII-2 sebagai sampel, yang berjumlah 25 siswa. Tes membaca digunakan sebagai instrumen penelitian. Analisis data dilakukan dengan menghitung skor rata-rata dan uji t sampel berpasangan menggunakan SPSS versi 25. Hasil penelitian menunjukkan bahwa skor rata-rata posttest (61,4) secara signifikan lebih tinggi dibandingkan skor pretes (38,4). Uji t sampel berpasangan menunjukkan nilai t-hitung sebesar 5,253, yang melebihi t-tabel sebesar 2,064 pada taraf signifikansi 0,05 dengan 24 derajat kebebasan. Hal ini menunjukkan bahwa t-hitung lebih besar daripada nilai t-tabel, sehingga hipotesis alternatif (H1) diterima dan hipotesis nol (H0) ditolak. Dengan demikian, dapat disimpulkan bahwa penggunaan cerita bergambar efektif dan dapat direkomendasikan sebagai strategi untuk meningkatkan keterampilan membaca siswa.

ABSTRACT

Thesis of English Language Education Study Program, Faculty of Tarbiyah and Teacher Training, Universitas Islam Negeri Palopo. Supervised by Jufriadi and Husnaini.

This study aims to examine the effectiveness of using picture stories in teaching reading comprehension to improve students' reading skills at SMPN 08 Palopo. The research employed a pre-experimental design with a one-group pretest— posttest approach. The population consisted of 227 eighth-grade students across seven classes. The sample was selected using purposive sampling, with class VIII-2 comprising 25 students chosen as the sample. A reading test was used as the research instrument. Data were analyzed by calculating mean scores and conducting a paired sample *t*-test using SPSS version 25. The findings indicate that the mean posttest score (61.4) was significantly higher than the mean pretest score (38.4). The paired sample *t*-test yielded a *t*-value of 5.253, which exceeded the *t*-table value of 2.064 at a 0.05 significance level with 24 degrees of freedom. This result confirms that the calculated *t*-value was greater than the critical *t*-value, thereby leading to the acceptance of the alternative hypothesis (H1) and the rejection of the null hypothesis (H0). Consequently,

it can be concluded that the use of picture stories is effective and may be recommended as a strategy to enhance students' reading skills.

CHAPTER 1

INTRODUCTION

A. Background

Reading is a vital skill in English, as it serves as a gateway to accessing information from various sources such as books, magazines, newspapers, and learning materials in science and technology. This skill is crucial and highly necessary for students because their academic success largely depends on their reading ability. Through reading, students can improve their vocabulary, grammar, and comprehension skills, which in turn support the development of their listening, speaking, and writing abilities. Furthermore, reading is a method of gathering information that enhances students' vocabulary, comprehension, and other language skills.

Ideally, every student is expected to become a proficient reader and achieve a certain level of reading competence. Reading offers many advantages, such as supporting students in learning, helping them articulate their ideas, and familiarizing them with common language structures. However, there are also students who become bored when reading English texts and struggle to understand them. In addition, many

students face difficulties in comprehending English passages and show a lack of interest in reading English materials.¹

The significance of reading is emphasized in the translation of the Qur'an, specifically in the noble verses of Surah Al-Alaq, verses 1 to 5:

The meaning:

" Read in the name of your Lord who created. Created man from a clot. Read, and your Lord is the Most Generous. Who taught by the pen. Taught man that which he knew not." ¹

In teaching reading, teachers are encouraged to incorporate alternative materials to enrich the classroom reading experience. These materials, often in the form of media, can help create a supportive and engaging learning environment that captures students' interest and increases their motivation. While students are guided through various reading activities, it is essential to maintain their motivation and foster effective reading habits.²

The advantages of illustrated stories include the following: the use of images can enhance students' creativity; engaging pictures can make classes and the learning process more enjoyable; images are easy to obtain, for example from magazines, newspapers, books, the internet, or even by drawing them as needed; and images can represent real-life situations in a different way, allowing students to imagine and interpret them more vividly.¹

During observations of eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo, the researcher found that although the students were generally active in class, they often encountered difficulties when learning English, particularly in reading. One student mentioned: "We don' t understand the reading textbooks well enough, we don' t understand the meaning of the passages, it is hard to read the textbooks because the spelling is different from the pronunciation, and our interest in reading is low because we also don' t have enough vocabulary."

Based on the statement above, the researcher conducted a study on teaching reading comprehension through the use of illustrated story texts as a medium to address the challenges faced by eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo.

B. Problem Statement

Based on the background described above, the researcher formulated the following research question:

" Is the use of illustrated stories effective in enhancing the reading comprehension skills of students at SMPN 08 Palopo?"

C. Objective of the Research

In line with the problem formulation, the aim of this research is to determine the effectiveness of using illustrated story texts as a medium to enhance the reading comprehension of eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo.

D. Scope of the Research

This research falls within the field of applied linguistics and involves the use of illustrated story texts as a medium in reading instruction.

E. Significances of the Research

The significance of this research is categorized into two aspects: theoretical and practical.

1. Theoretically

This research offers a solution for identifying suitable English teaching media, particularly to enhance students' reading comprehension of procedure texts.

2. Practically

a. For students

This research is expected to stimulate students' interest and motivate them to engage actively and creatively in learning English, while also improving their reading comprehension through the use of illustrated story texts.

b. For teachers

This research provides teachers with in-depth knowledge and information about the use of media, such as illustrated story texts, to stimulate students' interest in reading. It also contributes to creating a more effective classroom atmosphere by employing engaging and meaningful teaching media.

3. For researchers

This research can serve as a valuable reference or scientific resource for future researchers who are interested in conducting studies on reading comprehension using various types of instructional media

CHAPTER II

REVIEW OF LITERATURE

A. Previous Research Findings

Many researchers have conducted studies using concepts similar to this research. Five relevant studies support this study.

The first research was conducted by Andi Mitrayani (2018), entitled " Teaching Reading Comprehension by Using Make a Match Method of the Tenth Grade Students in MAN Palopo." This thesis focused on teaching reading comprehension to tenth-grade students at MAN Palopo. The research problem addressed was whether the Make a Match method is effective in enhancing the reading comprehension of tenth-grade students in class IIS 1 at MAN Palopo. The objective of the study was to examine the effectiveness of the Make a Match method in improving students' reading comprehension. The research employed a pre-experimental design, utilizing pre-tests and post-tests to gather data. The population consisted of tenth-grade students from class IIS 1, and the sample was selected through purposive random sampling. The number of samples was 30 students. The results of the data analysis showed that the t-obtained score, calculated using SPSS 23, was higher than the t-table value. The t-obtained was 5.161, while the significance levels were 2.045 at 5% and 2.756 at 1%. Thus, 2.045 $\leq 5.161 \geq 2.756$. From the significance value, it was shown that the p-value was 0.000.3

The second research was conducted by Jusmini (2017), entitled " Using Picture Stories to Improve Students' Reading Comprehension of the First Year of Senior High School 1 Bungoro." This study aimed to examine the extent to which picture stories are effective in improving students' reading comprehension, particularly in narrative texts. It employed a quasi-experimental design with a nonequivalent control group design using purposive sampling. The study involved 40 students, with X MIPA 6 (20 students) as the experimental class and X MIPA 1 (20 students) as the control class. The findings revealed that the reading skills of the first-year students of SMA Negeri 1 Bungoro improved through the use of picture stories. The mean score of the experimental class increased from 36 in the pre-test to 80.25 in the post-test. The result of the t-test also indicated effectiveness, with a value of 6.57, which was higher than the t-table value of 2.024 (6.57 > 2.024). This meant that the alternative hypothesis was accepted while the null hypothesis was rejected.¹

The third research was conducted by Rhevika Elytis (2021), entitled " The Use of Picture Story on Students' Reading Comprehension at the Tenth Grade Students of MAN 3 Padang Panjang." This study employed a quasi-experimental design aimed at examining the impact of picture stories on students' comprehension of narrative texts. The population consisted of tenth-grade students at MAN 3 Padang Panjang. A total of 50 students were selected using a cluster random sampling technique and divided into two groups: an experimental class and a control class. The instruments used were questionnaires, and the data were analyzed using SPSS 20. The findings showed that the mean post-test score of the experimental class was 79, while that of the control class was 71.2. This indicated a significant difference between the two groups, leading to the rejection of the null hypothesis (H0) and the acceptance of the alternative hypothesis (Ha). In other words, picture stories significantly affected students' reading comprehension of narrative texts at the tenth grade of MAN 3 Padang Panjang.⁴

The fourth research was conducted by Shella Marcelina (2019), entitled " The Effect of Short Story on Students' Reading Comprehension

(An Experimental Research of Second Grade at SMPN 5 Rejang Lebong in Academic Year)." This study employed a quasi-experimental design. The population consisted of all second-grade students at SMPN 5 Rejang Lebong. A homogeneity test was conducted before determining the research subjects. Based on the results, class VIII A was chosen as the control group and class VIII B as the experimental group. The instruments used were pre-tests and post-tests, and data were analyzed using the t-test formula. The findings showed that the mean pre-test score was 65.0, and the post-test score was 70.0, indicating an improvement of 5.0 points. In the experimental group, the mean score was 65.0 with a standard deviation of 3. 82. Thus, the post-test score of 70.0 reflected a 5.0-point improvement after treatment.

The fifth research was conducted by Ade Sinta (2022), entitled " The Effect of Picture Stories on Students' Reading Comprehension at MTs. Teladan Gebang." This study employed a quantitative approach using a quasi-experimental method. The population was the eighth-grade students of MTs. Teladan Gebang, consisting of seven classes. Two classes were chosen as the sample, with 27 students in the experimental class and 27 in the control class. The data collection instrument was a multiple-choice test. A pre-test and post-test were administered to both groups. In the treatment,

the experimental class was taught using picture stories, while the control class was taught using only text. The experimental class showed an improvement of 43.7 points (from 35.19 in the pre-test to 78.89 in the post-test). The independent samples t-test result showed a t-value of 5.063, which was higher than the t-table value of 1.659 (5.063 > 1.659). Therefore, the alternative hypothesis was accepted, and the null hypothesis was rejected, indicating that picture stories significantly improved students' reading comprehension at the eighth grade of MTs. Teladan Gebang.⁵

The following section outlines the similarities and differences with the previous studies. The first study by Andi Mitrayani (2018), entitled "Teaching Reading Comprehension by Using Make a Match Method of the Tenth Grade Students in MAN Palopo," shares similarities in terms of calculating research results, while the differences lie in the methods and media used. The second study, conducted by Jusmini (2017), entitled "Using Picture Stories to Improve Students' Reading Comprehension of the First Year of Senior High School 1 Bungoro," has similarities in the media and methods but differs in design and instruments. The third study by Rhevika Elytis (2021), entitled "The Use of Picture Story on Students'

Reading Comprehension at the Tenth Grade Students of MAN 3 Padang Panjang," shares similarities in the use of media but differs in research design. The fourth study by Shella Marcelina (2019), entitled "The Effect of Short Story on Students' Reading Comprehension (An Experimental Research of Second Grade at SMPN 5 Rejang Lebong in Academic Year)," is similar in its use of a quasi-experimental design with two groups, but differs in the calculation methods and media applied. The final study by Ade Sinta (2022), entitled "The Effect of Picture Stories on Students' Reading Comprehension at MTs. Teladan Gebang," employed a quasi-experimental quantitative method. The similarities and differences lie in the media and methods used.

B. Literature Review

1. The Concept of Reading

a. Definition of Reading

Reading is a crucial language skill, as it serves as a primary means through which individuals acquire knowledge and information. It is a language process that involves the reader, the text, and the interaction between them. Through reading, we gain deeper insights and expand our understanding of various topics. Reading is an activity primarily controlled by the eyes and the brain, the eyes capture the message, while the brain

interprets its meaning. According to the *Oxford Learner's Pocket Dictionary*, reading is defined as the act of interpreting written material and the manner in which that material is understood. Furthermore, reading is a method of gathering information. It enhances students' vocabulary, comprehension, and other related skills. 1

According to Hilda Melani Purba, Humairo Sakinah Zainuri, Nadia Syafitri, and Rizky Ramadhani (2023), reading is a process aimed at developing oral communication skills. It involves interpreting the codes or messages crafted by the author for the reader. Reading is essential for students since it allows them to gain new knowledge from previously read texts. It is also the process of identifying valuable ideas, which makes it crucial for readers to understand what they have read. ⁷ Reading is considered one of the fundamental language skills taught in Indonesian language education. From elementary school, middle school, and high school, even up to university, reading continues to be studied. Reading skills

are very important for all levels of education, because students who lack reading ability will lag behind, which may result in limited knowledge. Learning to read plays an important role in Indonesian language and literature subjects. Every educator hopes that their students will master reading skills. Ideally, students should not only be able to read quickly and identify the main idea but also understand the deeper meaning of the text.¹ This means that reading is not merely the activity of pronouncing sentences but also comprehending their meaning.⁸

b. Components of Reading

Reading consists of three main components, which are:

1) Phonics

Phonics involves connecting written letters or letter combinations with their corresponding sounds. This skill includes recognizing spelling patterns and understanding how to apply them in both reading and writing. For example, the letter *f* represents the /f/ sound, *c* can sound like /k/ or /s/, and *igh* corresponds to the long /i/ sound. Phonics can be taught using various methods, as there are multiple approaches to applying this skill in reading. Each method offers readers a different strategy for decoding and

learning new words. One such approach is synthetic phonics, which teaches readers to construct words from the smallest sound units. In this method, learners first associate individual letters with their corresponding phonemes (sound units) and then blend these sounds to form complete words.

2) Phonemic awareness

Phonemic awareness refers to the ability to recognize, focus on, and manipulate individual sounds (phonemes) within spoken words. For instance, it involves distinguishing between similar sounds such as /f/ and /h/, recognizing that removing the /s/ from *smile* results in *mile*, as well as practicing blending, segmenting, and identifying rhymes. This skill is auditory in nature, relying on listening rather than visual cues. Phonemic awareness can be developed through various instructional methods. One such method is phoneme isolation, in which learners identify and separate the individual sounds in a word to better understand its meaning.

3) Vocabulary

Vocabulary development involves the continuous expansion and deepening of word knowledge, including the regular addition of new terms to both spoken and written language. It also includes understanding the meanings of words in various contexts, refining word definitions, and developing the ability to use language creatively, such as in poetry or

wordplay. Students who read successfully up to third or fourth grade but later begin to struggle often face challenges with vocabulary. A rich vocabulary is best acquired through reading, as spoken language and television typically provide only a limited range of words.

Vocabulary is a crucial component of language that English learners must master. A strong vocabulary foundation enables students to better understand and use the English language. It plays a key role in communication, allowing individuals to convey their thoughts, emotions, ideas, and intentions effectively. In educational settings, English teachers often rely on traditional methods such as providing definitions, oral repetition, and writing exercises to teach vocabulary. However, these conventional approaches can become monotonous for students and may negatively affect their academic performance. Students should therefore learn English terminology that is relevant to the content covered by the teacher.¹

c. Kinds of Reading

The types of reading skills include:

1) Reading aloud

Reading aloud requires first interpreting the written symbols and then accurately producing the corresponding sounds. Typically, when individuals

are asked to read aloud, they prefer to preview the text beforehand to become familiar with its content. In the actual process of reading aloud, they usually find that their eyes are several words, if not lines, ahead of their tongues.

2) Extensive reading

Of these five kinds of reading activities, the first three—survey reading, skimming, and superficial reading- are sometimes grouped together and called extensive reading. The purpose of this type of reading is to cover the largest possible amount of text in the shortest amount of time. A relatively low degree of comprehension is sufficient, either because that is all that is needed in a particular situation, or because the material itself is highly redundant, as is often the case with newspaper reports. The label " extensive reading" emphasizes not the actual skills involved but the outcomes it produces, namely familiarity, though not necessarily thorough familiarity with a large body of reading material. Engaging in extensive reading provides the volume of practice necessary to achieve rapid and efficient reading. It is also one way for foreign learners to be exposed to a substantial sample of the target language, especially if they wish to learn it without actually living in the country where the language is spoken.

3) Intensive reading

The remaining two types of reading activities— content study reading and linguistic study reading— are often grouped together and referred to as intensive reading. Again, the focus is not on the nature of the skills themselves but on the outcomes, in this case a deep and thorough understanding of the written text. The emphasis is on detailed comprehension of relatively short passages. The objective is to achieve full understanding of the logical argument, the structure or organization of the text, its symbolic, emotional, and social connotations, the author's attitudes and purposes, as well as the linguistic strategies employed to achieve those purposes.

4) Reading speed

Closely related to comprehension is reading speed. Naturally, the rate at which text can be read decreases as the depth and detail of understanding increase. However, several other factors also affect reading speed, such as the clarity of the text itself and the extent to which the content is already familiar to the reader. Nevertheless, it is possible to develop reading speed, and efficient reading involves combining high speed with high levels of comprehension. Every teacher should aim to foster increased general reading speed in students, particularly fluent silent reading. Fluent silent reading is especially necessary for anyone intending

to pursue higher education. Since it is relatively easy to double or even triple one's reading speed, it is clear that the effort to achieve this should be made.⁹

d. Strategy of Reading

In reading skill in learning reading, formulated as follows:

- 1) Skimming is quick reading to grasp the general idea of a passage. It is an activity that is appropriate when there is not enough time to read something carefully, or when trying to decide whether a passage deserves closer attention.
- 2) Scanning is similar to skimming in that the reader moves rapidly through a passage at an initially uncomfortable pace. However, the search is more focused since the information needed is very specific—usually a date, a number, or a place.
- 3) Reading for thorough comprehension is reading with the aim of understanding the writer's complete message, including both main points and supporting details. This type of reading is the primary concern of most reading classes.

4) Critical reading requires us to guide students beyond the stage of "thorough comprehension." It encourages them to respond to texts with the same critical judgment they are likely to use when reading in their native language.¹

2. The Concept of Reading Comprehension

a. Definition of Reading Comprehension

Reading comprehension is the process of constructing meaning from written language by interpreting textual information in light of prior knowledge and experiences, while using appropriate and efficient comprehension strategies. Furthermore, reading comprehension is an activity in which the reader's brain and eyes work together to build connections. This process enables the reader to study what he or she reads and retain the information.¹⁰

Reading comprehension is the activity of understanding the essence of a piece of writing in English. The core referred to here is the ideas or thoughts contained in each English text. There are two elements that form the reading comprehension process: vocabulary knowledge and text

comprehension. To comprehend a text, it is essential to understand a portion of the vocabulary used within the written content.¹

Reading comprehension involves more than just recognizing words—
it requires fully understanding the content being read. True comprehension
means not only grasping the meanings of individual words but also
interpreting them in context to form opinions, thoughts, and reflections
about the overall message conveyed by the text. ¹¹ Reading is a fluent
process in which readers combine information from a text with their own
background knowledge to construct meaning. Comprehension is the ability
to understand and interpret both spoken and written language. ¹²

Reading comprehension is a continuation of initial reading. Dalman (2013:87) states that reading comprehension is a higher-order process. After students pass through the early stages of reading, they move on to reading for deeper understanding. Reading comprehension is thus a cognitive activity (reading to understand), where the reader is required to grasp the meaning of the content.

According to Abidin (2012:59), reading comprehension refers to reading activities aimed at extracting information from a text. It is described

as a process in which readers actively engage with the content to understand the information, messages, and meanings conveyed. These activities minimally involve both visual and cognitive skills. ¹ Teaching reading comprehension is essential for supporting various tasks, learning processes, and academic activities, as it increases student engagement in reading. ¹³ Furthermore, reading comprehension involves both obtaining and constructing meaning from written language. The use of selected and organized expressions highlights both the importance and the limitations of the text as a contributing factor in reading comprehension. Comprehension involves three main elements: the reader, the text, and the process of interaction. ¹

b. Level of Reading Comprehension

Mark A. Clark categorizes reading comprehension into four major groups, namely:

1) Imperative reading

Interpretive reading involves understanding the underlying meaning or reading between the lines—grasping ideas that are not explicitly stated

but are implied within the text. This level of reading comprehension goes beyond simply understanding the literal meaning.

2) Creative reading

Creative reading extends beyond the content provided by the author, requiring readers to think critically and engage their imagination while reading. In this type of reading, the reader is encouraged to generate new or alternative ideas and solutions beyond those offered in the text.

3) Critical reading

Critical reading involves assessing the author's ideas by comparing them to established standards and drawing conclusions about their accuracy. This type of reading requires the reader to reflect thoughtfully on the source of the material. Effective critical reading relies on understanding the literal meaning and includes the processes of interpretation, application, analysis, and synthesis.

4) Literal reading

Literal reading, or literal comprehension, refers to understanding and recalling the explicit information presented in the text. This represents the most basic level of reading comprehension.¹⁴

c. Process of Reading Comprehension

As cited in Suparman's thesis, Wiryodijoyo proposes a strategic approach to the reading process:

1) Perception

Perception refers to the ability to recognize words as meaningful units.

2) Comprehension

Comprehension refers to the ability to understand words as the author intended, connecting them to meaningful ideas within the context of the text.

3) Reaction

Reaction involves responding thoughtfully to what the author has expressed.

4) Integration

Integration refers to the ability to understand ideas or concepts by linking them to the writer s background and incorporating this understanding into the reader s own experiences.

3. The Concept of Narrative Text

a. Definition of Narrative Text

Narrative text is a type of English text (genre) that originates from recount texts and news items, aimed at telling stories about past events and entertaining readers. Before analyzing examples of narrative texts, it is important to understand the typical generic structure of narrative texts, which generally includes the following elements:

1) Orientation

Orientation is the opening part of a narrative text, where the characters are introduced, along with the setting, including the time and place of the story.

2) Complication

Complication is the section of a narrative text that presents the problems or conflicts faced by the main character.

3) Resolution

Resolution is the part of a narrative text that provides the solution to the main character's problems. This section may conclude the story positively or negatively.

4) Reorientation

Reorientation is the concluding part of a narrative text, typically summarizing the ending of the story, which can be either happy or sad.¹

Narrative text tells a story that involves complications or conflicts and seeks to provide resolutions to these problems. A key element of narrative text is the narrative mode, which encompasses the techniques used to convey the story through narration. Narrative texts serve to entertain and/or inform readers while delivering a message that conveys a theme— a universal idea that transcends time and culture— and/or a moral lesson derived from the story.¹⁵

A narrative is any account that presents a series of connected events and can be classified into different categories: non-fiction (such as new journalism, creative non-fiction, biographies, and historiography) and fiction (including prose literature like short stories and novels, as well as certain forms of poetry and drama, though in drama the events are mostly performed rather than narrated).

b. Generic Structure of Narrative Text

The generic structure of narrative text is composed of several elements. According to Anderson and Anderson, it includes four main parts: orientation, complication, sequence of events, and resolution. The details are as follows:

1) Orientation

Orientation serves as the introduction to the text, providing an overview of its content, including the main topic, the characters involved, as well as the time and place where the events take place.

2) Complication

The complication section of the text describes the events involving the characters, focusing on the conflicts that arise between them. Complication is a crucial element of a narrative; without it, the text cannot be categorized as a narrative. These conflicts may be natural, social, or psychological in nature.

3) Sequence of events

The sequence of events is the part where the narrator explains how the characters respond to the complication. These events may be presented in chronological order or through flashbacks, allowing the audience to experience the story from the narrator's perspective.

4) Resolution

Resolution marks the conclusion of a narrative text, where the characters address and resolve the problems caused by the conflict. Whether successful or not, this phase brings the conflict to an end.

c. Types of Narrative Texts

1) Legend

A legend is a story about human actions that both the storyteller and the audience believe to have actually occurred within human history. Generally, a legend is a brief, traditional, and historicized narrative presented in a customary manner. Some consider legends to be a type of folktale. Examples of legends in narrative texts include:

- a) Sangkuriang
- b) Malin Kundang
- c) The Legend of Tangkuban Perahu
- d) The Story of Toba Lake
- 2) Fable

A fable is a brief allegorical story that conveys a moral lesson, typically featuring animals that speak and behave like humans. Examples of fables in narrative texts include:

- a) Mouse Deer and Crocodile
- b) The Ants and the Grasshopper
- c) The Smartest Parrot
- d) The Story of Monkey and Crocodile
- 3) Fairy tale

According to Wikipedia, a fairy tale is a type of short story in English that corresponds to the French term conte de fée. Fairy tales commonly feature folkloric beings such as fairies, goblins, elves, trolls, dwarves, giants, or gnomes, and often involve elements of magic or enchantment.

Examples of fairy tales found in narrative texts include:

- a) Cinderella
- b) Snow White
- c) Pinocchio
- d) Beauty and the Beast
- e) The Story of Rapunzel
- 4) Myth

Another type of narrative text is the myth, which closely resembles folklore. The main difference is that myths are often believed to have actually occurred in real life. For example, stories like *Aji Saka* and *Dewata Cengkar* are regarded by many people as true.

5) Romance

According to *Wikipedia*, romance is a fictional story that describes the chronicles of the characters' lives in detail and depth. In romance stories, the narrative does not merely portray fragments of life events but often spans from birth to adulthood. The term *romance* comes from the French *romance*. Initially, it referred to stories written in the Romance language. Examples of romance narratives include *Romeo and Juliet* and *I' m One of That Fool Man.*¹

4. The Concept of Illustrated Stories

a. Definition of Illustrated Stories

Illustrated stories are a type of media that can be effectively used in the teaching and learning process, particularly in reading. They help stimulate students' creativity and imagination by presenting the story visually, rather than relying solely on lengthy written texts. Illustrated stories have long been used as a learning tool because they can boost students' interest and motivation in reading. By engaging with both the text and the

accompanying images, students not only read the story but also visualize the actions and events depicted, thereby enhancing their overall understanding.

According to Sudjana and Rivai, illustrated story media in the teaching and learning process can foster students' interest in learning and create an appreciation for reading. ¹⁶ This means that picture stories are interesting and easy to comprehend, making them helpful for teachers in facilitating the teaching and learning process. The lack of reading interest and the difficulty students face in understanding texts require teachers to use media that can attract attention and make learning easier. Wright states that music, pictures, furniture, objects, and colors can encourage students' interest in learning. ¹ Picture story media also functions as a means of communication among people. As social beings, humans tend to engage in all activities together, which requires communication. One of the tools of communication is writing, and writing stories is a form of expressing one's feelings. Through stories, humans reveal realities or imagined events.

According to Fariyatul and Bandono, illustrated story media is characterized by the presence of tasks, goal structures, and reward systems that distinguish it from other visual media. In the learning process using

illustrated story media, students are encouraged to collaborate on common tasks and coordinate their efforts to complete the assignments given by the teacher. The purpose of illustrated story media is to improve students' academic outcomes, help them accept diversity among their peers, and develop their social skills.

b. The Advantages of Illustrated Stories

In Sabnawati's thesis, the advantages of using illustrated stories are as follows:

1) Engaging images

The use of images can enhance students' creativity. Attractive and engaging images make the classroom atmosphere and the learning process more enjoyable.

2) Economical images

Images are easy to obtain, for instance from magazines, newspapers, books, or the internet. They can also be created by drawing them as needed.

3) Effective images

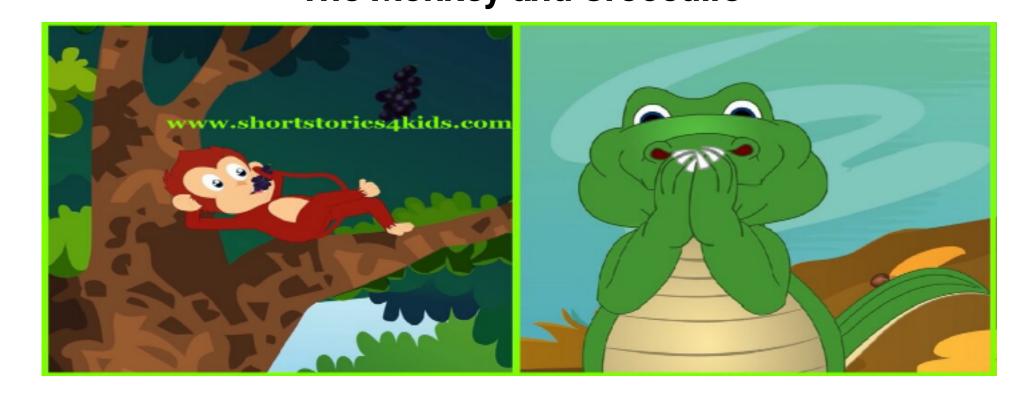

Images can represent real situations in a different way, namely through seeing and imagining the illustrations. 18

c. The Disadvantages of Illustrated Stories

According to Roslina in Subnawati's thesis, the disadvantages of illustrated stories were observed during the fifth meeting in class. The use of illustrated stories to teach reading skills can also make students feel bored. Therefore, it would be better if they were interspersed with other types of media. Moreover, illustrated stories should also be utilized to teach other skills such as speaking, writing, and listening.¹

d. The Example of Illustrated Stories

C. Conceptual Framework

In reading classes in particular, it is essential for teachers to create a conducive learning environment that promotes student involvement in various classroom activities, encouraging them to become active participants and to develop a genuine interest in reading.

The theoretical framework consists of:

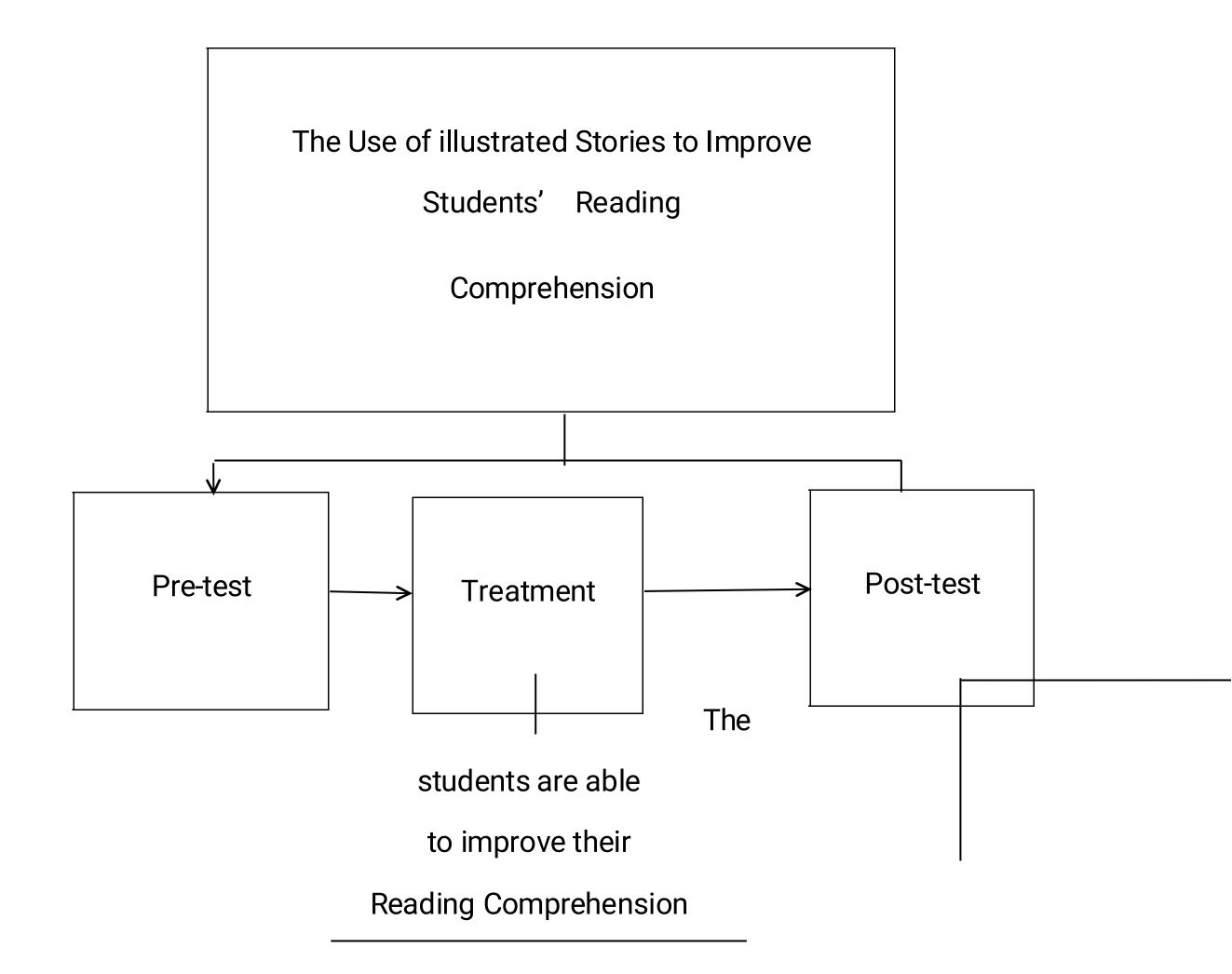


Figure 2.1 Conceptual Framework

D. Research Hypothesis

Based on the theory above, the research hypothesis is formulated as follows:

 H_1 : The use of illustrated stories is effective to improve students' reading comprehension at SMPN 08 Palopo.

 H_0 : The use of illustrated stories is not effective to improve students' reading comprehension at SMPN 08 Palopo.

CHAPTER III

RESEARCH METHOD

A. Method and Design of the Research

1. Method

This research employed a pre-experimental approach. The method was chosen by the researcher to assess the effectiveness of using illustrated stories in enhancing students' reading comprehension skills at SMPN 8 Palopo.

2. Design

In this study, the researcher gathered, organized, and analyzed data to draw conclusions. This quantitative research adopted a pre-experimental design, specifically using a one-group pre-test and post-test format. The design is presented as follows:

B. Variables of the Research

In this pre-experimental research, two variables were involved namely:

1. Dependent Variable

The dependent variable in this study was the students' ability to comprehend reading texts.

2. Independent Variable

The independent variable in this study was the use of illustrated stories.

C. Location and Time of the Research

This research took place at SMPN 8 Palopo, specifically involving eighth-grade students. The school is situated at Jl. Dr. Ratulangi No. 66, Balandai, Bara District, Palopo City, South Sulawesi, with the postal code 91914. This research was conducted for one month in 2024.

D. Population and Sample

1. Population

The population in this research consisted of eighth-grade students at SMPN 8 Palopo. There were seven classes in total: VIII 1, VIII 2, VIII 3, VIII 4, VIII 5, VIII 6, and VIII 7, comprising a total of 227 students. Each class had approximately 25 students.

2. Sample

The sample of this research was class VIII 2. This class was chosen because many teachers considered the students' knowledge level to be relatively low, especially in learning English. The sample was selected using purposive sampling, as the researcher considered this class interesting to study. Therefore, all 25 students from class VIII 2 were included as the research sample.

E. Instruments of the Research

The instruments used in this study were a pre-test, a post-test, and reading stories. In this research, the researcher used this instrument to help researchers collect data.

F. Procedure of Collecting Data

The data collection procedures were conducted through the following steps:

1. Pre-test

The pre-test was administered at the initial stage, prior to the implementation of the treatment. Its purpose was to assess the students' baseline reading comprehension skills. This step allowed the researcher to compare the students' abilities before and after the application of illustrated stories as a learning strategy. Before giving the pre-test, the researcher gave prior explanations regarding the structure of the questions and the correct way to respond. Afterwards, students were given a story to read, which served as the basis for answering the test questions accurately.

2. Treatment

In this research, the researcher implemented a treatment using illustrated stories. The treatment was conducted over five sessions. The following are the steps involved in the treatment process:

a. First Meeting

- 1) Opening activities
- a) Greeting.
- b) The researcher explained the objective of the study to the students.

2) Running activities

At the first meeting, the researcher explained narrative text, including the types of narrative texts. During this session, the researcher discussed legendary stories and explained what is meant by legend stories. After that, the researcher divided the students into five groups. The researcher then distributed stories that had been cut into pieces and shuffled, specifically the legend of *Sangkuriang*. Each group was tasked with arranging the pieces of the story into a complete narrative. Once the groups had finished, the researcher checked their work and determined which group had arranged the story correctly. Afterward, the students returned to their seats, and the researcher distributed another illustrated story. The students were instructed to read and then discuss the vocabulary found in the *Malin Kundang* story together. Finally, to determine whether the use of illustrated story media could improve students' reading comprehension, the researcher conducted an evaluation by administering a series of multiple-choice questions based on the content of the story.

- 3) Closing activities
- a) Researcher gave the conclusion of the material.
- b) Closing the class.

b. Second Meeting

- 1) The researcher explained what is meant by a fable story.
- 2) The researcher organized the students into five separate groups.

- 3) The researcher distributed stories that had been cut into pieces and shuffled, specifically the fable story *The Smartest Parrot*.
- 4) Each group then arranged the pieces of the story into a complete narrative.
- 5) After each group had finished composing the story, the researcher checked and determined which group had arranged the story correctly.
- 6) After that, the students returned to their seats, and the researcher distributed another illustrated story. The students were instructed to read and then discuss the vocabulary in the *Mouse Deer and Crocodile* story together. Finally, to determine whether the use of illustrated story media could improve students' reading comprehension, the researcher conducted an evaluation by administering a series of multiple-choice questions based on the content of the story.

c. Third Meeting

- 1) The researcher explained what is meant by a fairy tale story.
- 2) The researcher organized the students into five separate groups.
- 3) The researcher distributed stories that had been cut into pieces and shuffled, specifically the fairy tale story *Beauty and the Beast*.
- 4) Each group then arranged the pieces of the story into a complete narrative.

- 5) After each group had finished composing the story, the researcher checked and determined which group had arranged the story correctly.
- 6) After that, the students returned to their seats, and the researcher distributed another illustrated story. The students were instructed to read and then discuss the vocabulary in the *Cinderella* story together. Finally, to determine whether the use of illustrated story media could improve students' reading comprehension, the researcher conducted an evaluation by administering a series of multiple-choice questions based on the content of the story.

d. Fourth Meeting

- 1) The researcher explained what is meant by a myth story.
- 2) The researcher organized the students into five separate groups.
- 3) The researcher distributed stories that had been cut into pieces and shuffled, specifically the myth story *Dewata Cengkar*.
- 4) Each group then arranged the pieces of the story into a complete narrative.
- 5) After each group had finished composing the story, the researcher checked and determined which group had arranged the story correctly.
- 6) After that, the students returned to their seats, and the researcher distributed another illustrated story. The students were instructed to read

and then discuss the vocabulary in the *Story of Aji Saka* together. Finally, to determine whether the use of illustrated story media could improve students' reading comprehension, the researcher conducted an evaluation by administering a series of multiple-choice questions based on the content of the story.

e. Fifth Meeting

- 1) The researcher explained what is meant by a romance story.
- 2) The researcher organized the students into five separate groups.
- 3) The researcher distributed stories that had been cut into pieces and shuffled, specifically the romance story *I' m One of That Fool Man*.
- 4) Each group then arranged the pieces of the story into a complete narrative.
- 5) After each group had finished composing the story, the researcher checked and determined which group had arranged the story correctly.
- distributed another illustrated story. The students were instructed to read and then discuss the vocabulary in the *Romeo and Juliet* story together. Finally, to determine whether the use of illustrated story media could improve students' reading comprehension, the researcher conducted

an evaluation by administering a series of multiple-choice questions

based on the content of the story.

3. Post-test

Following the treatment, the researcher administered a post-test to

the students. In this stage, students were allotted time to read a story.

Afterwards, the researcher distributed a worksheet containing 15

multiple-choice questions. The students were required to read the provided

story text and respond to the questions based on their understanding of the

content.

G. Technique of Data Analysis

After gathering data through the administration of the pre-test,

treatments, and post-test using several instruments, the researcher then

proceeded to focus on analyzing the data. To determine the percentage of

students' scores in the reading test, data analysis involved calculating the

mean score and conducting a paired sample t-test using SPSS version 25.

The following formula was used:

P=FN× 100

Where:

P: Percentage

F: Frequency

N: Number of Sample¹

In the process of data analysis, the researcher established a scoring classification, which is presented in the table below:

CHAPTER IV

FINDINGS AND DISCUSSION

A. Findings

The results of this study are presented to illustrate the data that have been statistically analyzed. This includes students' scores on the pre-test and post-test, the percentage classification of those scores, as well as the mean and standard deviation for both tests.

In this section, the researcher presents the overall student performance in reading comprehension on both the pre-test and post-test, along with the mean scores, standard deviations, and score percentage classifications. These results are displayed in tabular form and calculated using SPSS version 25. To provide further clarification, the researcher offers a complete overview of students' reading comprehension scores from the pre-test and post-test.

The data are presented in the following table:

Referring to Table 4.1, the students' reading comprehension scores in the pre-test can be observed. Seven students obtained a score of 33, five students achieved a score of 40, four students received a score of 26, three students obtained a score of 53, three students achieved a score of 20, two students received a score of 66, and one student attained a score of 73. To determine the average score of the students in this test, the researcher conducted calculations using SPSS version 25. The results are presented in the descriptive statistics table.

Referring to Table 4.2, the students' reading comprehension scores in the post-test can be observed. Five students obtained a score of 80, five students achieved a score of 60, four students received a score of 73, four students obtained a score of 20, two students achieved a score of 86, two students received a score of 66, one student attained a score of 93, one student achieved a score of 53, and one student obtained a score of 40. To determine the average score of the students in this test, the researcher conducted calculations using SPSS version 25. The results are presented in a descriptive statistics table.

The table reveals that the highest student score was 73, while the lowest was 20. Additionally, it indicates that the average (mean) score of students on the pre-test was 38.36, with a standard deviation of 14.73.

The table illustrates that the highest student score was 93, while the lowest was 20. Furthermore, it shows that the mean score of students on the post-test was 61.40, with a standard deviation of 23.01.

Based on Table 4.5, it can be seen that before the students were given the treatment—" teaching reading comprehension through illustrated stories to the eighth-grade students of SMPN 08 Palopo"—none of the students achieved the "excellent," "very good," "good," or "fairly" classifications. There were 3 students (12%) out of 25 who achieved the "fairly good" classification. In addition, 8 students (32%) were classified as "poor," and 14 students (56%) were classified as "very poor." Based on these data, it is evident that the number of students who scored "very poor" was greater than those who obtained other classifications. It can be concluded that the students' reading comprehension was still low.

Table 4.6 shows the students' score classifications in the post-test. The data indicate that in the post-test, there were 3 students (12%) who achieved the "very good" classification and 5 students (20%) who were classified as "good." In addition, 6 students (24%) were classified as "fairly good," and 4 students (16%) were classified as "fair." Furthermore, 2 students (8%) were classified as "poor," while 5 students (20%) fell into the "very poor" category. These results indicate that the students' reading comprehension improved after the treatment through illustrated stories for the eighth-grade students of SMPN 08 Palopo.

The paired samples statistics table for the pre-test and post-test shows that the standard deviation for the pre-test was 14.730, while for the post-test it was 23.019. In addition, the standard error was 2.946 for the pre-test and 4.603 for the post-test. The table also displays that the mean score on the pre-test was 38.360, whereas the mean score on the post-test was 61.400.

The paired samples correlation table for the pre-test and post-test showed a correlation coefficient of 0.392 between the two tests.

Additionally, the table indicates that the significance value for both the one-tailed and two-tailed tests was p < 0.001. This suggests that there is a consistent and significant correlation between the pre-test and post-test scores in this study.

The hypothesis was tested using SPSS version 25. In this analysis, the researcher applied a paired samples t-test to determine whether there

was a significant difference between the students' mean scores on the pre-test and post-test.

The results of the paired samples test showed that the calculated t-value (T_x) was 5.253, with 24 degrees of freedom (df). Meanwhile, the critical t-value (T_t) at the 0.05 significance level with 24 degrees of freedom was 2.064. Since the calculated t-value (5.253) was greater than the critical t-value (2.064), this indicates a significant difference between the two sets of scores.

Furthermore, the significance value obtained from the t-test was 0.001, which is lower than the standard alpha level of 0.05 (0.001 < 0.05). Thus, the alternative hypothesis (H_1) was accepted, and the null hypothesis (H_0) was rejected. This confirms that there was a significant difference in students' reading comprehension before and after the use of illustrated stories. Therefore, the researcher concludes that illustrated story media is effective in improving reading comprehension among eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo.

B. Discussion

This section presents the results of the data analysis in the findings.

It discusses the use of illustrated stories in teaching reading comprehension to eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo, comparing

their performance from the pre-test to the post-test. The researcher chose the title " *Teaching Reading Comprehension through Illustrated Stories* to *Eighth-Grade Students of SMPN 08 Palopo*" because, at the research site, students showed very little interest in learning English, especially in reading skills. Therefore, the researcher formulated this title to investigate whether the use of illustrated story media was effective in increasing students' reading interest at SMPN 08 Palopo.

In the pre-test, the researcher asked students to answer multiple-choice questions related to narrative texts. The results showed that no students achieved classifications of "excellent," "very good," "good," or "fairly." There were 3 students (12%) out of 25 who achieved a "fairly good" classification, 8 students (32%) were classified as "poor," and 14 students (56%) were classified as "very poor." The students achieved a mean score of 38.36 with a standard deviation of 14.73. The highest score recorded was 73, while the lowest was 20. In the post-test, the highest score increased to 93, while the lowest remained at 20. The mean score for the post-test was 61.40, with a standard deviation of 23.01. The correlation between the pre-test and post-test scores was 0.392, while the significance values for both the one-tailed and two-tailed tests were p < 0.001.

Based on the analysis of the student classification table in the pre-test and their average scores, the researcher concluded that students' reading comprehension was still low.

The results of the paired samples t-test revealed that the calculated t-value (Tc) was 5.253 with 24 degrees of freedom (df). In comparison, the critical t-value (Tt) at a 0.05 significance level and df = 24 was 2.064, showing that Tc was greater than Tt (5.253 > 2.064). This outcome, supported by the significance value of 0.001 (which is less than 0.05), indicates a statistically significant difference between the pre-test and post-test results. Therefore, the alternative hypothesis (H_1) was accepted, while the null hypothesis (H_0) was rejected.

According to Sudjana and Rivai, illustrated story media in the teaching and learning process can develop learning interest and create appreciation among readers. ¹ This means that illustrated stories are interesting and easy to comprehend, making them useful for teachers in facilitating learning. The lack of reading interest and the difficulty students face in understanding texts require teachers to use media that is more

engaging and capable of attracting students' attention. Wright also argues that music, pictures, furniture, objects, and colors can increase students' interest in learning. ²¹ Picture story media serves as a means of communication between people. As social beings, humans tend to carry out activities together, and communication is essential for these interactions. One form of communication is writing, where storytelling becomes a medium for expressing feelings. Through stories, humans reveal things that are either real or imaginative.

According to Fariyatul and Bandono, illustrated story media is characterized by specific tasks, goal structures, and reward structures that distinguish it from other image-based media. In the learning process using illustrated stories, students are encouraged to collaborate on a common task and coordinate their efforts to complete assignments given by the teacher.¹

In conclusion, incorporating illustrated stories in teaching reading comprehension proves to be effective in enhancing students' reading abilities. This approach is considered one of the most suitable methods, as it allows teachers to present engaging and visually appealing learning

materials. The comparison between pre-test and post-test results shows a significant improvement in scores after the implementation of illustrated stories in the learning process, indicating the success of this treatment. Furthermore, it is evident that students demonstrate greater interest in learning English. The use of illustrated stories has a positive impact on students' motivation, making the learning experience more enjoyable and comfortable.

The advantages of picture stories, according to Riyadhus et al. include: students' cognitive strengths, which are related to thinking and reasoning. Initially, students who did not know, did not understand, or felt confused could eventually gain understanding through the aid of picture stories. With simple storylines and clear messages, illustrated stories make comprehension easier. They also evoke emotional responses such as happiness, interest, or even sadness depending on the storyline presented through pictures and animations. Moreover, the conative effect of picture stories influences students' intentions, determination, and efforts after engaging with the texts. Clearly, picture stories play an important role in learning because they enable readers to imagine and visualize content. In addition, picture stories are easier to understand and more engaging to read.

CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTIONS

This chapter presents the conclusions and suggestions derived from the results of the experimental study.

A. Conclusion

This research was conducted to determine the effectiveness of illustrated stories as a medium for enhancing students' reading skills. The target population consisted of eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo. After conducting the research and analyzing the collected data, it was evident that there was a significant improvement in students' reading performance following the use of illustrated stories in instruction. The results of the hypothesis testing indicated that H₀ was rejected and H₁ was accepted. This means that the use of illustrated stories as a teaching medium had a positive and effective impact on improving the reading skills of eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo.

Moreover, students demonstrated greater language fluency, improved content understanding, and fewer vocabulary errors. They were also able to comprehend the material more easily and showed increased enthusiasm for learning. This is supported by the pre-test and post-test

results, where the average score rose from 38.36 in the pre-test to 61.40 in the post-test. Based on the findings presented in the previous chapter, the t-test results showed that the calculated t-value (Tc = 5.253) was higher than the critical t-value (Tt = 2.064), meaning Tc > Tt. Thus, the null hypothesis (H_0) was rejected, and the alternative hypothesis (H_1) was accepted. It is concluded that there is a significant difference in teaching reading comprehension before and after using illustrated stories media. Therefore, the use of illustrated story media is effective in improving the reading comprehension of eighth-grade students at SMPN 08 Palopo.

B. Suggestions

Considering the various benefits of using illustrated stories to enhance reading comprehension, particularly in understanding narrative texts, the researcher would like to offer the following suggestions:

1. For Teachers

Teachers are encouraged to diversify the learning media used in the classroom rather than relying solely on one method. Incorporating illustrated stories as a medium can help engage students more actively in the learning process.

2. For Students

Through the use of illustrated story media, students are expected to improve their reading comprehension skills effectively.

3. For Schools

Schools should explore various alternative learning activities that can support the improvement of teaching quality, one of which is the use of illustrated story media to foster students' interest in learning.
